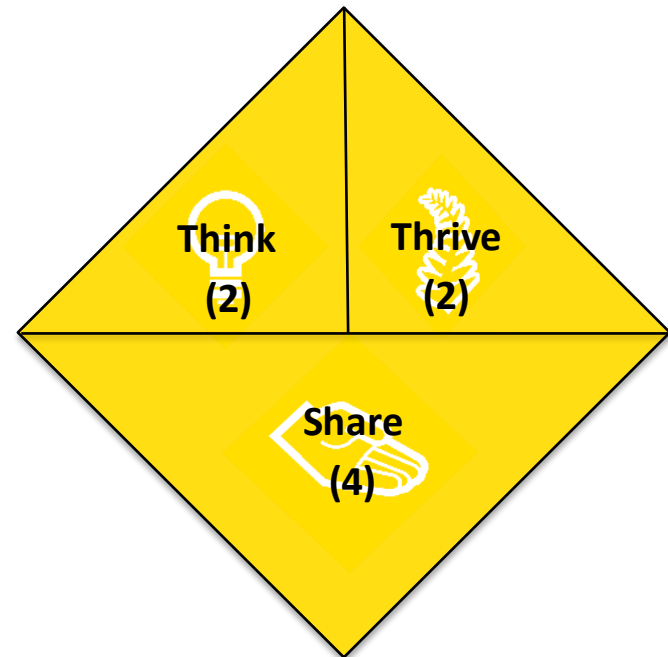




Our Honors Participation requirement is designed to enhance students' classroom experiences and foster a socially and intellectually diverse group of citizen scholars who value depth and breadth in the life of the mind as well as the outward application of these efforts to better the community. Based on feedback from the Honors community and national best practices, the Honors College participation and service requirements have changed to an events-based rather than an hours-based system. Further, we have adapted our extracurricular offerings to include virtual opportunities to better serve the needs of the entire Honors population.

In keeping with our Honors tagline, there will be **three (3) categories** Honors Participation: **Think, Thrive, and Share**. Each fall and spring semester, students will complete at least **two (2) Think** events/activities; **two (2) Thrive** events/activities; and **four (4) Share** events/activities. Among Think, Thrive, and Share selections for the semester, students must incorporate **one (1) diversity, equity, and inclusion** event/activity that enhances an individual's understanding of and respect for non-dominant cultures and **one (1) arts and culture** event/activity that contributes to their comprehension and appreciation of creative and artistic expression.

Honors students will select from among our listed and categorized offerings available in the weekly *Honors Announcer* and Honors Google calendar. Approval can be sought for non-listed activities and events by contacting the HSO Participation Records Coordinator who will consult Honors administration. ProfLink will be used to report and track completion of Honors Participation requirements.

¹ Students in their first semester in the Honors College will fulfill all Honors co-curricular requirements for that semester through active participation in the BLAST mentoring program.

² For each semester in which they serve on the HSO or BLAST, officers/mentors fulfill all Honors co-curricular requirements.

³ The following students are not required to complete Honors Participation in that given semester: Education majors in their final, full-time clinical practice semester; students who are studying abroad for a full semester, and students in a full-time cooperative education (co-op) experience.
