 - a. President Houshmand

Summary of opening remarks: Inauguration went well. Plans to develop High Street as a cultural center. Main campus: Freshman Village to address over crowding—public/private partnership. Nexus in plans to add 400 beds, one and 2 bedroom apartments, and health clinic. Plans for a classroom building. Three companies are in the various stages of looking to locate on West campus. Developers and investors to use private funding. Sports Arena possible for West Campus. Athletics looking at a possible division move. Report due out soon.

Camden: \$50-90 million for College of Health Sciences building.

Average SAT 1215. Profile of student applicants improving. 11% growth in enrollment. Zero melt (compared to last year's 5-10 percent). Faculty will help with strategic planning and in deciding how to spend financial resources.

SoM integration money will be recouped. Very positive state of the University.

Questions from the floor:

? Students of color. What's the plan to increase?

A: We have a blue collar state population which makes it difficult to recruit quality students. Including women and people of color is on the radar, even in the cabinet.

? Parking and garages

A: The biggest problem is parking. We need a garage. But the schedule of classes contributes to parking problems. Students are paying for parking reflected in tuition. It is worse at Stratford. Ease the peak time for classes. As we grow, so grows the need to park.

? Light rail?

A: Plans suggest eight years, best guess.

? Plans for green buildings?

A: Strike a balance. The issue is financial.

? Requirements for new hires to articulate a plan for grants and external funding. Humanities not the same as hard sciences in the respect of garnering funding for their projects. We are concerned that such requirements for new hires will drive candidates away.

A: The idea behind two tracks: Some professors will be getting grants, others won't.

? Online course mandate

A: The need is there. Space, MOOCS, trend dictates, access. There are not threats to do it but have some trust that creating online courses means moving in the right direction.

? Rowan 2024: The ultimate vision?

A: To renew the university as an institution. Inclusive, diverse, responsive to economics, priced right, 25,000 students total – 15-16,000 at Glassboro. We need to work together.

b. Update on both Rowan Core and Strategic Planning from Roberta Harvey Gen Ed/Rowan Core: Curriculum proposal due out this fall.

Strategic Planning (<u>www.rowan.edu/open.usp</u>) Our 10 year plan was obsolete. We needed a new structure. Senate will take a vital role along with the strategic planning advisory committee.
